Home Advice for patients who have undergone LLETZ (large loop excision of the transformation zone) Surgery



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Following your minor operation:

- You can expect to lose a moderate to heavy amount of discharge for up to two to three weeks.
- If you have a lot of fresh bleeding or excessive messy discharge, please see your GP as you may need some treatment to prevent infection setting in.
- It is advisable to avoid strenuous exercise such as jogging, swimming etc., for a few days following your treatment.
- No gym or horse riding for two weeks following surgery
- No sex for four weeks following surgery and then use a sheath / condom during intercourse during the following four weeks.
- Do not use tampons for four weeks following surgery.
- You may bath or shower as usual.
- Return to work when you feel well enough or as your surgeon has advised.
- You should not drive until you can comfortably perform an emergency stop.
- Return to your normal activities as soon as you are able.

For 24 hours following your general, local or regional anaesthetic:

- Do not drive a motor vehicle, ride a bicycle or operate machinery.
- Do not lock the bathroom or toilet door.
- Do not make important decisions or sign documents.
- Do not drink alcohol.
- If there are any problems after you return home, please telephone your GP.

It is important following your surgery to remain as mobile as possible.
